Gladly, more people could join prayer because we have more time being homebound, and we don't need to travel to get to prayer meetings. Several missionaries who are staying on the field say they are busier than ever teaching bible online.

*The Hong Kong Association Of Christian Missions have been able to gather missionaries online for a chat. Titus (See photo) was given the honor to speak encouraging words to more than 60 international workers sent by Hong Kong churches to Thailand, Philippines, Japan, Ukraine, UK, Hollant, India, Middle East, etc. It was a most heart warming and fun occasion. Many requests to do that more often. Thanks to modern technology. These workers are at different time zones and are usually busy during the day. But because all are "shut in", we were able to gather online. *Many of you are concerned about the political situation here. On the positive side, many citizens are reaching out to the young people as good neighbors. Some churches are filled by young people on Friday nights. Looking back, prior to 1997 there was a tide of migration. Years later, Hong Kong rose again. 2020 will likely see another multitude leaving their beloved homeland for political and economic reasons. Let us pray that hardship will open hearts for the gospel.
